

Dear Mr. Mayor,

I am writing you in reference to the newly constructed Parshall Flume placed in Indian Creek directly below our property at 102 Apache Drive, Indian Creek. While I understand the need for this device, I was very surprised and shocked at the nature of this industrial apparatus being placed directly in our down valley view corridor at the living and dining room windows of our residence. This industrial apparatus is in total conflict with the pastoral nature of the subdivision and has destroyed the entire residential nature of our property. The vertical assembly of this device is extremely obtrusive and stands nearly seven feet tall with the solar collector at the top. The solar collector reflects directly into our living room.

I am respectfully requesting the City reconsider the need for this device at all since this is the lower flume and is the second one placed on the Creek. Can the vertical components of the system be redesigned in any way to lower the upper assembly? There are different types of flumes- would another model be less offensive? The solar collector could also be placed elsewhere so as not to reflect into our house. Needless to say the location of this system should have been placed 100 feet upstream or downstream where the existing vegetation would have hidden this visual atrocity. Since these are engineering questions, I am requesting that further inquiries be made of the manufacturer to consider modifying this flume or if it is needed at all. I am requesting your Engineering Department to inquire and reconsider this issue and please respond as soon as possible.

You and your staff are invited by appointment with me to visit on site to see the degrading impact of this assembly as built. A photograph does not show the negative visual nature as much as a site visit.

Programs:

- Eight story time programs were held in April with a total of 88 kids and 50 adults in attendance. A big thank you to our guest reader, Charlotte Pullerio. Also to our special guest author, Bill Pereira. The kids thoroughly enjoyed listening to Bill speak on his book, *The Adventures of LC, the Lucky Calf* and he gave a copy of his book to each child to take home with them.

- A total of 52 teens and tweens took advantage of April programs. Programs included a book discussion and the very popular TnT program. Because of the popularity of this event on Thursday afternoons, games and crafts are offered at each event instead of a rotation from week to week.
- Three adult programs were offered.
 - Four people were in attendance for Dennis Beckley's presentation on Social Security benefits.
 - April should have been dubbed 'Take a Hike' month as both Scott Marchant and Matt Leidecker presented within a week of each other. The two local authors saw a HUGE audience—44 and 38 people respectively. Nice!
- We participated in Kindergarten registration at the Community Campus on April 3rd. Dawn Adams and I staffed a booth at the event. Books and information on early literacy were disbursed to the kids and parents. For the first time, we registered people for library cards. Our numbers were submitted to the Idaho Commission for Libraries (ICfL) who supplied the take-a-ways. They report that we have the highest recorded number of new patron cards at Kindergarten registration. It was a great opportunity and we hope to be able to participate again.
- Dayle Ohlau from the radio station, Wood River Radio, loves to promote our events at the library on her radio show. Thank you Dayle! She featured the library and National Library Week in April.

ICfL:

- Snapshot Day was held during National Library Week and we participated on Thursday, April 18th. The numbers were collected and put together in a really nice presentation by the commission. To view the video, click on http://youtu.be/vc_LNn_Hw98
- Kevin Tomlinson from the commission made a road trip to visit our library. He brought the new School Library Consultant, Jeannie Standal. We had a nice visit and discussed ways in which public libraries can assist schools since we have the same mission of educating our kids and creating a nation of proficient readers. We look forward to working with Jeannie in the future.

City:

- Diane Clark attended the meeting on 5B Bike Share. She then brought the information back to library staff. It is our hope that many city and library staff members will take advantage of this great program and get some exercise and fresh air during lunch breaks!

Staff:

- Staff is busy planning summer programs. For the first time, a family summer reading event will be held on June 18th. The focus will be on literacy on breakout sessions will be offered. Corbin Maxey is confirmed for the Summer Reading Finale which will be held at the Community Campus on August 15th. All children are invited to attend and The Blaine County Rec District will bring their kids in for the performance. We are also

excited to offer a passive interactive display for adults called 'Spuds in your Duds'. An example will be on display along with instructions. Jeans were donated by the Barkin' Basement and local resident, Sally Kern stitched them up to accommodate the seed potatoes and soil.

Technology:

- Nancy Gurney has been working with Roger Parker and IT staff from the City of Boise to configure the new receipt printer in the juvenile area. Due to the Citrix connection with Boise Public Library/City of Boise, there are some settings on their end that needed to be adjusted. It is still a work in progress but hopefully will be resolved in the near future.

LYNX:

- Mary DeWalt, Director from Ada Community Library has been working on a consortium wide quote on Freegal music. The quote of \$2,500 per year is based on circulation, population served and cardholders. As much as I would love to offer this music download service, I feel that the quote is still too high for us to participate. Mary is looking into the option of splitting the cost between two fiscal years.

Development:

- On April 9th, we hosted the Chamber of Commerce event—Wake up Hailey. Over 70 people attended! The new 5B Bike Share program was explained to the participants and two bikes were on scene so that people could take a look. There was much interest generated at the event—so much so that we have information at the circulation counter to hand out to interested people.
- I attended a conference in Twin Falls sponsored by the ICfL. A national reading initiative on reading proficiency was presented and school districts were also invited to attend. Part of the time was allocated for community round table discussions as we were asked to sit with others from each county. Unfortunately, I was the only one in attendance from Blaine County. I did however have a productive discussion with a representative from the Head Start program in Twin Falls and Hallie Kelly from the Lee Pesky Center. Hallie and I have met and developed a kindergarten pilot summer reading program which the Lee Pesky Center will execute at the library. We are very excited for this partnership to develop and grow.
- I continue to attend the quarterly meetings of the interagency group. Attendees include the Hunger Coalition, St. Luke's, Head Start and others. It is a good opportunity to round table and share ideas. The next meeting is in June.
- I attended the last nonprofit initiative class sponsored by CSI. The topic was conflict management.

Building:

- The custodial closet wall has been repaired. The cleaning supply docking station should be installed soon. I'm still waiting to hear from Kelly Schwarz on the estimates for the electric hand dryers.
