## Message from the Mayor **Fireworks Restrictions**

There are fireworks restrictions in Hailey City code:

1. Aerial fireworks are **NOT** allowed at any time. The City of Hailey puts on a safe aerial display for our town. Come out to enjoy the show July 4 at dusk.
2. Nonaerial common fireworks may be used to celebrate Independence Day only for the periods of time beginning at midnight July 1 and ending at midnight July 5.

## **Street Maintenance Using Chip Seal**

We commend our Public Works department for launching Hailey's first independent chip seal project.

The City of Hailey took delivery of a used chip spreader in late June, and 2 days later performed maintenance on streets in northeast Woodside. The project was begun early in the day, and continued until finished at 10:00 p.m. We received some very sincere thank-you calls directed to the Street Department and its Division Manager Kelly Schwarz.

You will see more chip seal projects over the summer, including chipping Second Avenue as part of the Pathways for People project on that street.

## **Woodside Boulevard Grasses**

Property owners south of Glenbrook Drive on Woodside Blvd may request to replace the tall fescue grasses that are in the landscape strip. Correspondence was sent to a limited 35 properties, inviting them to apply for a no-cost encroachment permit to change the type of landscape materials within the landscape strip. Permits will be considered case by case. If approved, property owners would then mow the alternative turf themselves.

The tall fescue grass within the landscape strip should NOT be mowed by homeowners. The City mows these grasses two or three times per year, after the fescue has formed seeds and can propagate. More frequent mowing causes the grass to die and weeds take over.

## Parks

### Park Adopters Perform a Great Service

Approximately 35% of the City's 40 acres of park space is cared for through Hailey's Park Adoption program, in which a local business chooses to perform services within the park at no cost to the city except our gratitude.

The Adopt a Park Program was founded in 2012. This year, there are five adopters: Clearwater Landscaping, G&G, Sun Valley Services, Swenke Landscape and Webb Landscaping. These civic-minded companies provide a valuable service to the community. The condition of the parks adopted by these companies shows the quality of their work.

Some of these companies have had unbroken years of service since 2012. Clearwater (Keefer Park), Swenke (Hailey Skate Park) and Webb (Hop Porter) have been adopters continually since 2012. In 2015, G&G Landscaping adopted Balmoral Park and Sun Valley Services began caring for Jimmy's Garden. In 2018 Blaine County Title took on the adoption of Foxmoor park, which had been previously cared for by C U Next Storm for a five-year term. The city is grateful to all park adopters; the parks are looking their best ever, thanks to these companies!

Hailey's four largest parks fall into the Gold Leaf adoption category. You will see Webb Landscaping's equipment in Hop Porter every week, mowing. Webb applies fertilizer to the park twice per year and blows out the irrigation system at the end of each season. In addition to their adoption work at Hop Porter, Webb responds to the City's needs in other parks, such as the clean-up of Heagle Park referred to on the next page.

**Volunteers Help Restore Heagle**

Heagle Park has been in a state of disrepair since it incurred substantial flood damage last year. City staff have been working with FEMA to get approval for clean-up funding. In the meantime, citizen groups have been helping out. **Kiwanis** and **Key Club** members spent time at the park in May, cleaning out the silt from the restrooms and pavilion area. With FEMA approval in hand, the City contracted with Webb Landscaping to clean up the silt within the park, remove and replace the impact material under the play areas, and haul away debris. The tennis courts will soon have new netting. The restroom won't be operational until a sewer line that was washed away by intense flood waters is installed.
