Subject: Governor rolls entire State back to Stage 3

Effective at 12 a.m. on Oct. 27, Stage 3 restrictions will be put into place statewide:

- Indoor gatherings must be limited to 50 people or less
- Outdoor gatherings must remain at 25% capacity or less
- Social distancing guidelines remain in place
- Long-term care facilities must require masks on the premises
- Nightclubs can only operate as bars, with customers seated, not standing.
- Employers are encouraged to continue allowing employees to work remotely or to make special accommodations for in-house employees

Despite the rollback, Little said Idaho's economy has not shut down. In-person church services will not end, travel in and out of the state will not be restricted, and schools will not be required to return to remote learning.

Hailey's Order, which is under discussion tonight, is more restrictive than the governor's Stage 3 protocol. There is no mask mandate in the State Order. The group size limitations are less restrictive than Hailey's group size limitations and our 1 person to 64 square feet of space requirement.

STAY HEALTHY ORDER**

October 27, 2020

BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES MAY CONTINUE OPERATIONS AT PHYSICAL LOCATIONS IN THE STATE OF IDAHO.

ALL INDIVIDUALS, BUSINESSES, AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES MUST ADHERE TO THE MANDATORY PORTIONS OF THE PHYSICAL DISTANCING AND SANITATION REQUIREMENTS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 3 OF THIS ORDER.

INDOOR GATHERINGS, BOTH PUBLIC AND PRIVATE, MUST ADHERE TO THE REQUIREMENTS IDENTIFIED WITHIN THIS ORDER.

OUTDOOR GATHERINGS, BOTH PUBLIC AND PRIVATE, MUST ADHERE TO THE REQUIREMENTS IDENTIFIED WITHIN THIS ORDER.

PATRONS OF BARS, NIGHTCLUBS, AND RESTAURANTS MUST REMAIN SEATED.

FACE COVERINGS ARE REQUIRED AT LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES.

The Governor and Director of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare (“Director”) hereby issue this order of isolation pursuant to Article IV, § 5 of the Idaho Constitution and Idaho Law.

The Director is authorized by Idaho Code § 56-1003(7) “to impose and enforce orders of isolation and quarantine to protect the public from the spread of infectious or communicable diseases.”

This Order is effective as of 12:00 a.m. October 27, 2020 and will continue to be in effect until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Governor and Director.

THE GOVERNOR OF IDAHO AND DIRECTOR OF THE IDAHO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MAKE THE FOLLOWING FINDINGS:

The basis for this Order includes, but is not limited to, the following findings.

The virus that causes Coronavirus 2019 Disease (“COVID-19”) has resulted in a global pandemic, is present in Idaho, and has infected nearly 60,000 Idahoans, resulting in 573 deaths to date. The virus is easily transmitted, especially in group settings, and it is essential that the spread of the virus be slowed to protect public health and safety and safeguard the ability of public and private healthcare providers to handle an influx of new patients.

This Order is based on evidence of a significant increase of cases of COVID-19 within the State of Idaho; as well as, the advice and input of state epidemiologists, public health experts, and guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (“CDC”) and the White House. This order is also based on the scientific evidence and best practices regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically, and evidence that the age, condition, and health of a significant portion of the population of the state places its citizens at risk for serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19.

Some individuals who contract the COVID-19 virus have no symptoms or have mild symptoms, which means they may not be aware they carry the virus. Because even people without symptoms can transmit the disease, and because evidence shows the disease is easily spread, gatherings can result in transmission of the virus.

The most recent state report for Idaho from the White House Coronavirus Task Force states that “Idaho is in the red zone for cases, indicating 101 or more new cases per 100,000 population [for the week ending October 16, 2020], with the 7th highest rate in the country. Idaho is in the red zone for test positivity, indicating a rate at or above 10.1%, with the 2nd highest rate in the country.”

Cases in Idaho have risen sharply in the past several weeks and are rising in most counties in the state. The number of individuals hospitalized with COVID-19 in Idaho has increased 55% in the past two weeks. As a result, hospitals across the state of Idaho, including the Veterans Affairs Medical Center, are at or nearing capacity. In some instances, hospitals have diverted patients to other hospitals within the state and in neighboring states.

Local health districts have traced reported infections to gatherings of people, including school-related events, social gatherings, and recreational events. In the judgment of public health officials, reducing the size of these gatherings will reduce spread of the virus in communities and protect vulnerable Idahoans.

Since June 2020, there has been a significant and concerning increase in cases of COVID-19 among residents and staff at long-term care facilities in Idaho. Outbreaks often start with a staff member or a visitor and spreads to other staff members and residents. Many staff members and all residents of long-term care facilities are at a higher risk of severe complications associated with contracting COVID-19. Currently, over 100 residential facilities are investigating one or more COVID-19 cases, and four new outbreaks were declared at long-term care facilities on October 24, 2020.

The scientific evidence shows that at this stage of the pandemic, it is necessary to slow virus transmission to protect Idaho’s vulnerable population and to prevent the healthcare system from being overwhelmed. In consultation with state and federal epidemiologists and healthcare experts, this Order is intended to protect the lives and safety of Idahoans, preserve capacity in our healthcare system and slow the spread of COVID-19 by limiting public and private gatherings, requiring patrons to remain seated at bars and restaurants, mandating masks in long-term care facilities, and requiring individuals to maintain physical distancing whenever possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE GOVERNOR OF IDAHO AND IDAHO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE DIRECTOR ORDER:

1. **Gatherings.** As defined by the CDC “gathering” means “a planned or spontaneous event, indoors or outdoors, with a small number of people participating or a large number of people in attendance such as a community event or gathering, concert, festival, conference, parade, wedding, or sporting event.”
 - a. **Indoor Gatherings.** Indoor gatherings of more than 50 people, both public and private, are prohibited. Indoor gatherings of 50 or fewer people must adhere to the Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements in Section 3 of this Order.
 - b. **Outdoor Gatherings.** Outdoor gatherings, both public and private, are limited to 25% of the maximum permitted occupancy of the facility or space as documented in the occupancy permit. If no such occupancy permit or limit exists, occupancy is limited to the number of persons that can convene while adhering to the Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements in Section 3 of this Order.
 - c. **Bars, restaurants, and nightclubs.**
 - i. All patrons must remain seated while consuming food or drink or when otherwise remaining on the premises, except for when entering, exiting, or using the restroom;
 - ii. Seating must be arranged and maintained so that tables are spaced at least six feet apart; and
 - iii. Nightclubs may continue to operate as a bar, subject to the requirements of this Section and this Order.
 - d. **Exemptions.**
 - i. Gatherings for political expression – including polling locations – and religious activities are not subject to the provisions of this Section; provided, however, that gatherings for purposes of political expression and religious activities must adhere to the Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements in Section 3 of this Order;

- ii. Gatherings exceeding the size and capacity limitations specified in this Order may receive an exemption if the organizer submits a plan for the gathering to the local health district having authority where the gathering is to occur, receives approval of the plan from the local health district, and ensures compliance with the approved plan at the gathering. The plan and any exempted gatherings must adhere to the Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements in Section 3;
- iii. Gatherings as defined in this Section do not include “educational activities.” The term “educational activities” means activities involving students taught by an educator in a school or equivalent setting; or
- iv. Extra-curricular activities, including athletics, practice, matches, performances and games may continue, including attendance of the participants necessary for the competition to occur, including but not limited to players, instructors, coaches, and officials. Attendance by non-participants, including spectators, remains subject to the requirements specified in this Order, including but not limited to those identified in Sections 1(a), (b), and 3.

2. Face Coverings at Long-Term Care Facilities.

- a. Anyone who enters a long-term care facility or campus who is not a resident is required to wear a face covering that covers their nose and mouth at all times.
- b. Exemptions. This requirement does not apply to:
 - i. Children under the age of 5;
 - ii. Any person while consuming food or drink;
 - iii. Any person with a diagnosed medical condition, mental health condition, or disability which prevents wearing a face covering; or
 - iv. Any person who is deaf or hard of hearing for purposes of communication, or any person communicating with a person who is deaf or hard of hearing.

3. Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements.

- a. Individuals not residing within the same household shall maintain at least six-foot physical distancing from other individuals whenever possible.
- b. Individuals should:

- i. Wash hands with soap and water for at least twenty seconds as frequently as possible or use hand sanitizer;
 - ii. Cover coughs or sneezes (into the sleeve or elbow, not hands);
 - iii. Regularly clean high-touch surfaces and not shake hands;
 - iv. Stay home if sick;
 - v. Wear face coverings while in public, especially when six-foot distancing is not always possible (e.g., inside businesses); and
 - vi. Follow additional protocols established in the Governor's Guidelines for Opening up Idaho published at <https://rebound.idaho.gov/>.
- c. Employers shall:
- i. Develop and implement measures to ensure employees and customers maintain at least six-foot physical distancing from other individuals whenever possible;
 - ii. Provide adequate sanitation and personal hygiene for employees, vendors, and patrons; and
 - iii. Frequently disinfect commonly touched and high-traffic areas and regularly clean those areas.
- d. Employers should:
- i. Identify how personal use items such as masks, face coverings, and gloves may be required by employees, vendors, and/or patrons;
 - ii. Provide services while limiting close interactions with patrons;
 - iii. Identify strategies for addressing ill employees, which should include requiring COVID-19 positive employees to stay at home while infectious, and may include keeping employees who were directly exposed to the COVID-19 positive employee away from the workplace, and the closure of the business until the location can be properly disinfected;
 - iv. On a case-by-case basis, include other practices appropriate for specific types of businesses such as telework where appropriate, screening of employees for illness and exposures upon work entry, requiring non-cash transactions, etc.; and


- v. Implement additional protocols established in the Governor's Guidelines for Opening up Idaho and the business-specific protocols published at <https://rebound.idaho.gov/>.
4. The violation of any mandatory provision of this Order constitutes an imminent threat to public health. Violation of or failure to comply with a mandatory provision of this Order may constitute a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both pursuant to Idaho Code § 56-1003(7)(c). The Governor and Director requests that the Sheriffs and Chiefs of Police in the State of Idaho, and Idaho State Police educate the public about this Order and ensure compliance with this Order.
5. This Order shall become effective as of October 27, 2020 at 12:00 a.m. and will continue to be in effect until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Governor and Director.
6. The Stay Healthy Guidelines dated June 13, 2020 is hereby rescinded.
7. To decrease the spread of COVID-19, the cities, counties, public health districts, school districts, and institutions of higher education within the State of Idaho may enact more stringent public health orders than those set out in this Order.
8. Each county and each city must promptly provide copies of the Order as follows: (1) by posting the Order on its website, (2) by posting the Order at each county courthouse and each city hall, and (3) by providing a copy to any member of the public requesting it. The Order will also be posted on the website of the Department of Health and Welfare.
9. If any provision of this Order or its application to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, then the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.

FAQ's Stage 3

Why is the Governor issuing this Order? Why now?

The Governor is taking this action to protect the lives and safety of all Idahoans and to ensure each of us have access to medical care should we need it.

Access to healthcare in Idaho is being threatened by the number of people in our hospitals due to COVID-19. Hospitals in many parts of the state are nearly or completely full and patients are having to be transferred to other hospitals in Idaho and in other states to accommodate demand.

Idaho has reached a point where there is a serious risk that Idahoans who get in an accident, or have a heart attack or stroke, or some other emergency need may not be able to obtain the emergency medical care they need.

Additionally, case numbers and infection rates in Idaho have escalated substantially in recent weeks, making it likely that the demand for medical care and hospital beds will increase in the coming weeks.

Does this mean schools are closed?

Response: No, schools remain open under Stage 3. Governor Little has dedicated millions of dollars to ensure schools are open safely and strongly feels our schools need to stay open. The spread we are seeing in the state is not linked to schools being open. [See section 1.d.iii. of the Order, which is on page 4.]

What businesses are shut down under Stage 3?

Response: Idaho is open. Under Stage 3 our economy will remain open.

Does this mean you are closing churches?

Response: No. Churches remain open under Stage 3.

How will this affect in person voting?

Response: Gatherings for political expression – including polling locations remain open under Stage 3. [See Section 1.d.i. of the Order, on the bottom of page 3.]

What about high school sports?

Response: Under stage 3 athletics can continue but with limited attendance at events. To adhere to the new social distancing measures, spectators and other non-participants will be limited. [See Section 1 and 1.d.iv of the Order, which is on pages 3 and 4.]

What about youth sports?

Response: Under stage 3 athletics can continue but with limited attendance at events. To adhere to the new social distancing measures, spectators and other non-participants in the activity will be limited. [See Section 1 and 1.d.iv of the Order, which is on pages 3 and 4.]

What about other extra-curricular activities such as band or theater?

Response: Under stage 3, extra-curricular activities can continue but with limited attendance at performances, concerts or other gatherings. To adhere to the new social distancing measures, spectators and other non-participants in the activity will be limited. [See Section 1 and 1.d.iv of the Order, which is on pages 3 and 4.]

How does this apply to Restaurants?

Restaurants remain open under stage 3 and need to continue to operate under the restaurant protocols and are required to seat patrons. [See Section 1.c of the Order, which is on page 3.]

How does this apply to Bars and Night Clubs?

Response: Bars remain open under Stage 3 but are required to seat patrons. Night Clubs can be open, but must seat patrons. We are hopeful it will help with the spread we are seeing in the 18-29 age group. [See Section 1.c of the Order, which is on page 3.]

Will the state be enforcing this order?

Response: From day one the Governor has stressed education and doing the right thing. We will continue to educate on ways to slow the spread and have faith that the citizens of our great state will do the right thing.

Does this mean the Governor is mandating masks?

Response: No. The Governor is not issuing a statewide mask mandate. The mask mandate only applies to Long-Term Care Facilities such as nursing homes and assisted living facilities. [See Section 2 of the Order, which is on page 4.]

Does this apply to funerals?

Response: Under Stage 3 religious activities are exempted. [See Section 1.d.i. of the Order, which is at the bottom of page 3.]

How does the 50-person limit apply to grocery stores and large shopping areas?

Response: Stage 3 refers to gatherings. Grocery stores, shopping areas (Walmart, Home Depot, etc.) and malls are not considered gatherings. However, those businesses should comply with the Physical Distancing and Sanitation Requirements in Section 3 of the Order, which starts at the bottom of page 4.

Does this mean college football is cancelled?

Response: No. Under stage 3 athletics can continue but with limited attendance at events. To adhere to the new social distancing measures, spectators will be limited. [See Section 1 and 1.d.iv of the Order, which are on pages 3 and 4.]

How does this apply to in person learning at universities?

Response: Education institutions remain open under Stage 3.

Do I have to quarantine if I have left the state?

Response: No. Under stage 3 you do not have to quarantine if you have left the state. That said, if you have been exposed or in an area with high spread, you are encouraged to take the proper protocols.

Does this mean our border is closed?

Response: No. Stage 3 does not restrict travel in and out of the state.

What does this mean for families and Thanksgiving?

Response: Under the order, gatherings of less than 50 people are allowed. Smaller gatherings should comply with the Physical Distancing Requirements of the Order whenever possible. Gatherings of all sizes are one of the primary areas where we are seeing spread. Now is the time to act to protect your loved ones.

Does this order supersede local orders?

Response: Yes, but local governments and public health districts have the legal authority to implement more stringent orders that go above and beyond Stage 3.

I have an event that falls outside the permitted size limits, what are my options?

Response: Gatherings exceeding the size and capacity limitations may receive an exemption if (1) the organizer submits a plan for the gathering to the local health district having authority where the gathering is to occur, (2) receives approval of the plan from the health district, and (3) ensures compliance with the approved plan at the gathering. [See Sections 1 and 1.d.ii of the Order, which are on page 4]

Has this Stage 3 been modified from the previous Stage 3?

Response: A few modifications were made that include mask mandates in assisted living facilities, mandating bars, night clubs and restaurants seat patrons, and limiting social gatherings to 50 indoors, or 25% capacity outside.

Who Determines the capacity of an indoor or outdoor venue?

Response: Capacity is usually set by the building code and permitting authorities. For venues that do not have its capacity set by the building code or permitting authority, capacity should be limited to the number of people that can comply with the six-foot physical distancing requirements set out in Section 3 of the Governor's Stay Healthy Order.

Who should I contact if I feel that somebody is not adhering to Stage 3?

Response: The Governor has stressed education and doing the right thing. We will continue to educate on ways to slow the spread. If you feel someone has been educated and is still not adhering to Stage 3, you can choose to contact local authorities who can help with education.

Thank you, Lisa. That is reassuring. We do have signs posted at all the businesses and hand sanitizer available to the customers. I also require my employees to wear masks (and, more generally, to follow the law...). However, I also do not permit them to sit on their cell phones and I expect them to arrive on-time to work--none of which I've ever been successful at enforcing. Thus, if the police would like to issue citations to any employees of ours not wearing a mask, I support them completely. They should also ticket them for arriving late and sitting on Facebook.

Technically, the new law specifically burdens the businesses with enforcement of the customer mask mandate under threat of closure. When this issue is reviewed next week, the City should shoulder this burden of enforcement and remove the threat of closure directed at the businesses. It is completely inappropriate to require businesses to engage in political confrontations with customers. Personally, I may not think this should be a political issue, *but it is for the people refusing to wear masks*. You might as well pass a mandate stating that Hailey businesses can only service Democratic customers and must refuse customer service to Republicans. It is obviously disappointing that a matter of medicine and science should be reduced to political party preference. All the same, that is the world we live in, and the enforcement of your mandate at the business level is confrontational and politically discriminatory. That's stupid, but it's true. It's also stupid to threaten businesses with forced closure for failure to discriminate against a political party in the local minority.

Please amend the law to reflect a more just and proper position wherein the City is responsible to enforce its own laws.

Also, it should not be the obligation of local businesses to enforce city laws. It should be the obligation of the city police. Employees have responded universally that they are uncomfortable engaging in the confrontation with customers who believe your draconian measures are politically motivated, communistic, and an infringement upon their liberties. The point is not whether you or I or the employee agrees that a face mask should be worn (personally, I do wear one and agree that they should be worn). Thank you for taking part in our Zoom meetings. Your input and perspective are of great value. I'm writing to ask that the council strongly consider 2 items at today's meeting.

1. Please put the onus of mask enforcement on the individual and NOT the local business owners. Our Small businesses are stressed enough financially and to ask an hourly employee, or any employee or business owner for that matter, to enforce clients to where masks is completely unfair. This puts all in not only uncomfortable positions but potentially hostile ones as well. Everyday I'm watching businesses getting shamed and boycotted for enforcing and not enforcing masks.
2. Please also allow businesses to become more aggressive with capacities providing they are following all other Stage 4 protocols. Our business models, especially in the restaurant, bar and hotel sector have been decimated. As we discussed, takeout is not an end all solution for businesses serving alcohol as that make up a tremendous percentage of our volume.

At Zou 75 Brendan has done extensive research on heap filter, which have been installed, as well as the ultraviolet light air purifiers. We are happy to share this information.

With most small businesses PPP money gone a shut down would be simply catastrophic. Just one example is we will be running the risk of losing a building that we have been paying mortgage on for the past 20 years and that is if things remain status quo through the winter. We are willing to work within certain parameters but simply cannot maintain at the current capacity restrictions.

Once again I thank you for your consideration of these items and your leadership of our great town.

We are encouraged by the possibility that curbside composting could be available.

- 1) What materials would be considered for pickup?
- 2) What container would the public use for the compost pickup?

The other option could be to have dumpster(s) at the Hailey Bullion & River St Park N Ride lot during Spring/Summer/Fall and after Christmas for people to dispose of their yard waste.

It would be great to save this kind of waste being dumped into our regular garbage cans, which we often see all around town.
