Hop Porter Park – Historical Narrative

Hop Porter Park, one of Hailey's oldest parks, has been a hallmark of Hailey's identity. Known previously as Community Park, Tourist Park, and most recently, Hop Porter Park, it has offered, and still offers, a little something for everyone.

Hop Porter Park began as a natural and primitive park where Native Americans fished for trout, traded goods, foraged for mushrooms, and camped under the Cottonwood canopy. Shoshone-Bannock tribal members camped here as they trekked over Richardson Summit west of Hailey on their way to the Camas fields near Fairfield. They shopped locally for supplies and provisions, and they brought with them their native smoked tanned leather gloves and bead work, all of which were sold or traded.

Between 1960 and 1970, the Jaycee's, with heavy equipment, cleared the trees and debris from the park as a community service project, setting a swing set, teeter totter, and an incredibly scary merry-go-round in the center. An oval gravel drive was built - nestled in the middle of the park – as an access point to the playground. The Jaycee's also cleared and painted the arch at the entrance to the park.

In the 1990's, the park was renamed Hop Porter Park - named after one of the City's Councilmembers, Hop Porter, who encouraged the rehabilitation and site organization of the park. Mr. Porter's rehabilitation efforts were fully realized when Hop Porter Park became the beneficiary of a community-wide fundraising effort. It was through this effort that the wooden playground structure was built – the teeter totter, swing sets, and scary merry-go-round replaced.

The new playground equipment, designed by an architect from Montana, integrated various drawing concepts from local children to assist with the overall design of the playground structure. The final design and playground plan reflects their drawings. The total cost to build the wooden structure – still standing today – was \$75,000.

Hey there Ashley,

The Solmeteric camera tells a lot of the story on the phone booth not functioning properly. See attached report.

*Both PV modules were dirty enough to be dysfunctional to start. Thie is due to a horizontal module, which will only hold snow & dirt as evidenced in the phone picture email I sent you.

*Horizontal modules in the winter are 100% worthless unless in full sun & cleared regularly, ie; top of a camper or van [see below Nov-April].

The West booth Solar access:

Annual is 37%

May-Oct - 42%

Nov-April – 22%

The East Booth Solar access:

Annual is 48%%

May-Oct - 50%

Nov-April – 44%

I did not continue with tearing the system apart to check the battery. I thought it better to talk with who ever put this together.

- Depending on the power draw of this system I do not know if the PV module is a correct size. * Need to measure the load & estimate the usage.
- There is no hope of getting enough power at the current location see attached report there just is not enough sun. *
 Need to move these or cut the trees.
- The module even tipped up to latitude angle is still so severely shaded might at least shed snow if the lower [leading] edge could drop snow to the ground VS pile up on the booth top. * Cut trees & remount the module. To allow for snow drop.

Give me a call & lets talk. Lets looks at what might be better options.

I did not quote on the Solar System on the town hall roof for these same reasons; the shading is way too much.
