Message from the Mayor

Mental Wellness, Suicide Prevention and Police Officers Memorial Day

At the last Hailey City Council meeting, Mayor Burke read a Proclamation that May be recognized within the City of Hailey as Mental Wellness month. The 5B Suicide Prevention Alliance will be focused on training in *Knowing the 5 Signs*. This effort is to make us all aware of how close anxiety, depression and potential suicide can be to us, and what we can do to help. Often friends, neighbors, co-workers or family members are suffering emotionally and don't recognize the symptoms or won't ask for help.

Know the 5 Signs training will be offered through the Hailey Public Library's adult education program on Thursday, May 13, 2021 at 5:30 PM. See details on Page 3, Library Events.

Also in May is **Police Officers Memorial Day**. Flags are lowered to half mast on May 15 in remembrance of all the police officers fallen in the line of duty. We remember all the men and women of law enforcement who act in good faith, standing with us against injustice, defending the defenseless, restoring peace to disordered situations and risking their personal well-being for public safety, with particular honor of those who have fallen as their duty calls them to act in all these ways of valor.

"Why is my water bill changing?"



Sewer Rates Adjusted

All Hailey City utility accounts are reviewed once a year for a sewer rate adjustment calculated by using the past winter's water use.

Whenever water is used within a household, it goes down the drain and must be treated as wastewater/sewer. In the summer, water use includes irrigation, which does not go down the drain. Assessments of the winter water usage, which does not include irrigation, is our method of assessing how much a particular household impacts the sewer system and treatment plant.

Every April, the City recalculates your sewer rates for the next twelve months. We calculate your *average* winter water usage based on the previous five months (November through March) and use that amount to set the corresponding rate according to the current wastewater rate table adopted by the City Council. Wastewater rates include your usage as well as a monthly bond payment which is intended to cover the indebtedness the city has on treatment plant improvements formerly approved by voters.

This annual process results in some utility bills going up, some may stay unchanged, and some may be decreased from the previous year.

And that is why you may see a change in your water bill.

Hailey Memorial Day Celebration

The Hailey Memorial Day Committee promises a unique celebration this year. While we can never fully repay our debt to America's fallen warriors and their families, we can remember their service and honor their sacrifice.



The strong and caring community of Hailey and the Wood River Valley will also be celebrated as, together, we remember our armed forces members and let them know *we will never forget*.

Over 420 veterans' graves will be decorated with flags and carnations this year on **Friday, May 29th** at the Hailey Cemetery. A memorial wreath will also be placed on the Blaine County Veterans Monument here, as well as a display of the armed Services individual flags from dawn to dusk, **May 31st**.

Margaret "Maggie" Dawn Springer Day Flyover Planned for Monday May 31, 2021 at 11 AM

Margaret "Maggie" Dawn Springer may be a name not many of us are familiar with, but a name worth noting nonetheless. The honored memories of our fallen veterans and their memories had a remarkable champion in Maggie, whose own longing to join the military was thwarted by a debilitating disease.

This young woman took up the cause for military service remembrance and played a huge part in the Hailey Memorial Day Celebrations. She was THE coordinator of Hailey's annual celebration for many years during her short life. She brought about flyovers of F-15s, A-10w and vintage World War II planes from the Warhawk Museum in Nampa.

She was awarded the Seven Seals Award and Idaho's Distinguished Service Medal. In 2010, the Governor Butch Otter declared August 31st as "Maggie Springer Day" in the State of Idaho. Memorial Day and its flyover this year fall on Maggi's day; Hailey has been determined to be eligible by the Air force for an Aerial Flyover on May 31st at 11:00 AM.

2021 Tour of Honor Motorcycle Ride

Tour of Honor is an award winning motorcycle tour that is a season long, self-directed ride to memorials and monuments around the continental US, Alaska and Hawaii. This year, for the first time, Hailey has been added to its list of memorial sites! The event honors our nation's heroes and through the efforts of its participants contributes to a number of charities.



The Idaho Development Impact Fee Act sets strict requirements by which cities may adopt or amend Development Impact Fees. Every 5 years, a study is conducted to assess the city's capital improvement plan as it relates to new growth and land assumptions. From this study new fees are derived in the areas of transportation, parks, and emergency services.

Hailey's 5-year study update is underway. The Development Impact Fee Advisory Committee will meet again on Thursday, May 13, 2021 at 5:30 PM to consider the proposed plan and fees, making recommendations to the City governing bodies. The Hailey City Council will review the plan in the month that follows, and adopt the fees. The public is invited to participate in any or all of these meetings.

Local Agriculture & the Environment

Current agricultural practices have damaging implications for the future of the environment. Commercial agriculture, called agribusiness, is highly mechanized, concentrated, typically specialization in the production of one crop (monocropping), and is reliant on heavy chemical applications such as pesticides, herbicides, and synthetic fertilizers. Large scale agricultural productions yield high emissions, lead to lots of soil erosion, and deliver pollutants into the air and water. In contrast, a local approach to agriculture reduces greenhouse gas emissions and increases biodiversity. These ecological services are super beneficial for local and global environment as they increase carbon sequestration, heighten air and water quality, and raise productivity of local soils.

Opponents to local agriculture point out that prices are higher and it requires more people to work in farming. Although prices are higher for locally produced foods, ultimately, agriculture is a consumer driven industry. If enough consumers avoid major agricultural companies' products, and attempt to buy more locally sourced foods, then eventually prices will decrease. Placing a heavier emphasis on sustainable agriculture in political discussions will be a helpful tool to end government subsidies of agribusiness and drive down prices. It's important that there is increased education and emphasis placed on the importance of farmers in our current society. Simply put, the world needs more farms, farmers, and smaller scale production catering to regional consumption.

What can you do to help support the growth of local agriculture? Primarily, if possible, buy from local farmers that use environmentally sustainable approaches to food production. Investing in local farms through donations or community service work will help these organizations produce food on a larger scale and cater to a wider variety of individuals. Finally, through political action and education, you can help assist in the transition to a more locally sourced and sustainable agricultural society. **Meg Keating, W.A.T.E.R. Club Member**

Hailey's Trash & Recycling Rates Increase June 1, 2021

Effective June 1, 2021, the cost of trash will increase. The new rates on current services are set at a variable rate: Larger trash cans will cost more per gallon than smaller trash cans.

Pay less by switching to a smaller trash receptacle & recycling more

Recycling collection is unlimited. Fill your recycling bin(s) with separated items, add as many sturdy containers as is needed to hold your curbside recyclables either within or beside your bin. Separate your curbside recyclables into the three allowed categories: 1) **Plastics**, 2) **Aluminum/tin**, 3) **Paper/Newspaper**.

Recycle Corrugated Cardboard and Glass at the Recycle Drop Off Site

Trash Rates Increase

Order Smaller Trash Can By June 1

The Hailey City Council authorized an increase in trash rates to go into effect June 1, 2021. These new rates set a variable rate on current services. Larger trash cans will cost more per gallon than smaller trash cans. Residents and businesses may be able to pay less by switching to a smaller trash receptacle and recycling more. A brochure on how to maximize recycling opportunities is enclosed. Hailey recycling is unlimited, and includes curbside pick-up of plastic, paper, aluminum and tin, and drop-off of corrugated cardboard and glass at a recycling drop-off site, combined with spring and fall yard-waste collection at Hailey's drop-off site. To order a smaller trash can, call Clear Creek Disposal. The delivery/exchange fees to switch to a smaller cart, which is \$33.90, is waived for a limited time.
