# MAYOR'S MESSAGE

To the Community:

As your Mayor, I am pleased to present to you my 2024 State of the City Report. Much like the President's State of the Union Address, Hailey's State of the City celebrates the community, recognizes accomplishments, identifies current challenges, and sets the stage for citywide goals for the year ahead.

## COMMUNITY

Hailey is the greatest place I know to live and work, and for one primary reason: the community. Our small size has allowed us to know each other as neighbors and to operate with a small-town, friendly approach. I value above all our sense of community and shared neighborly attitude. This year, we face national and international uncertainty. I place an emphasis on Hailey's role as a "Full-Service City". By that I mean the range of services we provide to our citizens by City staff, under policies for service provisions that are directly established by Hailey City Council.

Hailey has our own Police Department, Fire Department, Library, Road, Parks, Water, Wastewater, and full Utility Billing team. Few cities in our region directly offer such a wide array of services. As we look towards the future, we are exploring both our long-standing cultural independence as a Full-Service City and the efficiencies of combining services with other service providers.

Hailey has a 100-year legacy and culture of providing these services across broad categories. I embrace community dialogue regarding consolidation of services, but I do not take these conversations lightly. Ultimately, my goals for Hailey are to continue high levels of service provision at a reasonable cost, and to ensure that Hailey citizens have direct input into policy decisions as to how each critical service is provided.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

- *Handled 10,751 calls for service; 3,928 traffic stops; 824 citations; 234 vehicle crashes; 59 DUI's; 102 assault/battery; 114 theft/vandalism and 192 welfare checks*
- *Prioritized Officer and Support Staff mental health*
- *Accomplished an in-house Crisis Intervention Team Trainer; implemented Critical Incident Stress Management debriefs after critical calls for service; ten staff members and their significant others attended a First Responder weekend retreat for officer/couples*
- *Continued robust community outreach and building of trust and respect with the community*
- *Awarded a Federal COPS Grant for an additional Certified Officer*
- *Instrumental in the formation and hiring for the city's first ever Community Service Officer (CSO). The CSO position is budgeted through the Police, Public Works, and Community Development Departments, but primarily managed by and works out of the Police Department*
- *Provided Officers and staff the proper equipment, training, knowledge, and competitive pay to perform their duties effectively and safely*

## 2023 HAILEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS (CONTINUED)

### FIRE DEPARTMENT

- Chief Officers finished the Chief Officer 1 and 2 training at the International Fire Chiefs training conference
- Filled the vacant Fire Inspector Position and the Maintenance/Quartermaster positions with two Firefighter/EMT's bringing the full-time staff up to five positions
- Continued the wildland deployment program, revenue from these efforts was approximately \$33,000
- Four new students graduated from the EMT class and became nationally registered EMT's
- Two students graduated from the engineering class to become State Certified Driver/Operators
- Four firefighters attended rope and high angle rescue class and purchased new rope rescue equipment, bringing our total to six rope rescue technicians, enough for a team. This team can serve new recreation opportunities in Hailey, such as the Quigley mountain bike park.
- Installation of Firefighter Tiny Home on Wheels, providing an affordable option for a firefighter to live on site and able to initiate a quicker response to emergency calls in the city
- Answered over 700 calls for service, including two structure fires that were contained with minimum damage to the property

### STREET DIVISION

- Study of pedestrian crossing options on Main Street
- Careful analysis of all downtown street typical sections as part of Downtown Master Plan
- Successful installation of the River Street Bike Path and restriping project
- Entire downtown core area chip sealed and fog sealed
- Purchase of a significant new snow blower
- Main Street repaved, and drive lanes narrowed /car door safety area increased, as per City Council direction
- Main Street Peace Banner rebuilt and reinstalled, an "iconic" Hailey project
- Purchase of first fully electric vehicle

### WATER DIVISION

- Repaired all the leaks found in the 2022 city wide leak detection. Leaks repaired included 4 services and main repairs, 24 Fire hydrant repairs = 41.6 million gallons annually
- Fenced Quigley Tank with native colored security fencing designed to blend with the new trail
- Replace gas chlorine with liquid chlorine at River Steet Well and Northridge Well
- New truck fill station installed with better access and water billing capabilities
- Initiated Water Facility Planning study
- Replaced approximately 300 water meter registers

- *Installed and completed the new UV lights which advances the Water Reuse Program*
- *Installed and integrated a new program for running the biological process that was over 20 years old*

## GOAL OBSERVATIONS:

### HOUSING

**GOAL: Attract and retain a socio-economically diverse, working community. The cost of housing in our town remains dangerously high.**

Hailey has always been a community where our workforce can afford to rent or buy. We are currently at a tipping point which may fundamentally change the character of our community. The Council and I have made housing a top priority in housing through our municipal budget. This was furthered in 2023 by an 85% positive vote regarding 0.5% for housing Local Option Tax. We have continued to negotiate with new developments regarding the provision of workforce housing. I am pleased that our **community housing numbers increased in 2023 from 15% to 16% of our total housing stock.**

### EMPLOYEES

**GOAL: Create a foundation of hardworking people that care for/take care of our community and thrive in the workplace.**

I remain proud of our staff team and the work that they do. They readily embrace the ethic of the Council; they are responsive to citizens; creative and hard-working. We continue to do a lot with little. Hailey city government is a great place to work.

### TRANSPORTATION

**GOAL: Have clean and safe streets that support all modes of transport throughout all four seasons with emphasis on bikes, pedestrians, and public transportation in order to achieve a well-connected community.**

We continue to make progress on multimodal projects: completion of pathways; keeping pathways clear of snow and vehicles year-round; funding and support for Mountain Rides; participation in regional conversations regarding the future of Highway 75. A cornerstone of this effort is the adoption of the Hailey Downtown Master Plan, which will guide our streetscapes, parking and circulation for years to come. I am very proud of this planning effort and look forward to implementation of the many visionary projects in the Downtown Master Plan.

## ENVIRONMENT

We have made excellent progress on our local and regional climate projects, as listed in our accomplishments. Sustainability and climate protection remain one of our top priorities. These values will be imbedded in the work of updating our Comprehensive Plan, and the development of a Hailey Climate Action Plan.

I remain committed to high levels of service, and I will request voter input on any property tax increases or other significant costs as options unfold for the future.

Our unique character threads through everything that we do! We are growing, but we are growing thoughtfully and with intention. Rest assured that keeping the “Hailey” in Hailey is one of my top priorities.

## KEEPING A WATCHFUL EYE ON OUR REVENUE PERFORMANCE

Our municipal budget has been steady and strong since the decline of the pandemic. Local Option Tax and property taxes have remained steady. Building permit revenues, while up over 2020 and 2021, did not reach the peak high of 2022 in the past year. Construction costs remain very high, which, coupled with high interest rates, have dampened construction activity and new home building. I will continue to keep a watchful eye on our municipal revenues as we build our FY 24/25 budget.

---

## NATIONAL AND WORLDWIDE UNCERTAINTY

We are living in a period of great national and international uncertainty. Worldwide war and unrest impact our sense of peace and prosperity. Cities across the country continue to grapple with immigration impacts. The predictions of a national recession have lessened. What does this mean to us in Hailey? It means that many of us are choosing to “lean in” and focus on local issues that are under our control. Local governance and community conversation are all the more important in times of uncertainty. I plan to keep the dialogue going on our municipal activities throughout the year.

---

## LABOR SHORTAGES: STAFF RECRUITMENT VERSUS CONTRACTS FOR SERVICES.

While we are well-staffed in many of our essential departments, we have had great difficulty in both recruitment and retention in streets and parks. This means we are operating at limited capacity to plow the streets, clean the sidewalks, empty trash, clean the restrooms and maintain our beautiful parks. We have reluctantly turned to contracts for services in areas where we cannot adequately staff. It remains one of my top priorities to meet our citizens’ expectations in caring for parks, playgrounds and other assets. Contracts for services cost more, plain and simple. We continually evaluate what we can accomplish “in house” and where contracts might better meet the community needs and values.

# CURRENT CHALLENGES CONT'D

---

## BROADENING INCOME INEQUALITY AND CONTINUED HIGH HOUSING COSTS

The cost of housing in our town is at dangerously high levels. Hailey has always been a community where our workforce can afford to rent or buy. We are currently at a tipping point which may fundamentally change the character of our community. While we are aggressively working on housing issues, income inequality continues to grow.

---

## WHAT DO WE WANT TO BE WHEN WE GROW UP: REGIONAL VERSUS LOCAL SERVICE PROVISION

Hailey has a 100-year legacy of being a “Full-Service City”. I am proud of each of our departments, and the way they serve our citizens and keep them safe. At the same time, Hailey is actively engaging in regional conversations regarding service provision, most notably Fire and EMS. I am fully engaged in these conversations, and I support ongoing study and analysis. I urge careful and deliberate actions with a goal of ensuring equal or better levels of service for our community. I would plan to ask the voters for their input on any change that increases property taxes or adds other significant costs.

### CLARITY OF DIRECTION AND PARTNERSHIP

Take leadership direction from the Mayor and Council, continuing to accomplish creative and sustainable solutions with our small, talented staff pool. Promote a culture that values ongoing teamwork, both internally and with project partners: other local governments, nonprofits and others.

---

### CAREFUL BUDGETING

Hailey's current financial status is strong. Continue to use caution in the annual budgeting process, particularly with the addition of new staff. Keep a strong focus on the need to provide essential public services.

---

### OUTREACH AND TRANSPARENCY

Continue to improve upon user-friendly outreach tools such as newsletters, social media, website. Solidify a culture within city government of responsiveness to the public and "small-town friendliness". Strive for transparency in decision-making.

---

### BUILDING NEEDS

Hailey will plan strategically as to our building assets. The Hailey Fire Station is aging and should be studied for expansion or replacement. This study is needed with or without consolidation. Similarly, we are outgrowing our Library and need to look towards the future in order to continue to serve the community. Lastly, we need to fully own our Police Station, which is partially owned by the National Guard Armory.

- Focus our training on officer development and training our middle management to state certified officer levels.
